Letter from Peter Harrison

Dear Friends,

Humpty Dumpty speaking to Alice in *Through the Looking Glass* said, 'when I use a word it means exactly what I want it to mean, neither more nor less'. Unfortunately this is by no means true. Many years ago treatment for asthma was very limited, with the use of aminophylline suppositories quite common. The written instructions on the package were quite clear to me and the dispenser: 'The Suppositories: Insert one as needed, not more than every four hours' Unfortunately they were not as clear to the patient who swallowed them. No harm was done but no benefit ensued either.

On the other extreme the introduction of the word Brexit into conversation can still reproduce the anger and mutual distrust of the two sides eight years after the referendum. It is often difficult for older people to understand the pain and ire aroused by the unthinking use of the 'N' word in relation to a shade of brown or the distress occasioned by the expression of their affection felt for 'gollywog' dolls in their childhood when this reminiscence intends no pain to anyone. It requires quite deep and prolonged reflection to appreciate that, even if innocently done, it is possible to repeat and maintain prejudices buried deep in our unconscious minds.

Jesus said that it is not what we take in to our bodies that corrupts us rather it is by the words that come out of our mouths. He was speaking of the hypocrisy of the dietary laws, overscrupulously and over strictly followed by the Pharisees. In that he was uncontradictably correct. It is quite possible to subconsciously inherit or absorb prejudices from those we love and respect or those whose learning in other fields encourages us not to question pronouncements or views that are cruel and harmful.

The great philosopher Voltaire wrote 'Europeans had proved their great supremacy and courage over eastern nations'. How much damage have views like that caused over the centuries? Jesus also tell us that we should 'judge not lest we ourselves be judged'. We have to infer what he meant then and what those words mean now. Perhaps we may reasonably conclude that we should not be judgemental of others; rather seeking to engage them in discussion when we disagree. It may be we who need to modify our views. However judging in the sense of comparing and assessing different views, that is discernment, is surely something we must do. Where ideas that we have adhered to in the past clash with those of people who are hurt and feel discriminated against by them is it not incumbent on us to think about these carefully and consider the possibility we too have been prejudiced? It is not always an easy process especially when groups that are nursing their pain can themselves be excessive in their words that arouses anger rather than understanding. Fifty years ago those who advocated equal rights for women, people who felt sexual attraction for their own sex and those who felt themselves victimised by colonial oppression were either laughed at or ignored. Thankfully we are approaching greater fairness on

these issues in our society even if we have still a way to go. If we are to be faithful followers of Jesus we need to think about what we have said in the past, avoid future repetition and if necessary make apologies that could be shallow and meaningless if not followed by appropriate reparations. To live truthfully we must say what we mean, but to have integrity, we have to mean what we say.

First Reading Acts 12.1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.) When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him.

The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, 'Get up quickly.' And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, 'Fasten your belt and put on your sandals.' He did so. Then he said to him, 'Wrap your cloak around you and follow me.' Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision.

After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, 'Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and

rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting.'

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.'

Meditation Group

Oakham Christian Meditation Group meets every Wednesday evening at 6.00 at the chapel of St John and St Anne, Oakham. The group has been ecumenical from its very beginnings and all are welcome. Usually people gather from 5.30 in the common room for tea, then move into the chapel. The meditation begins with a introduction and a short reading, and with some reflective music before settling into

silence lasting 20-25 minutes, a time when people put down distractions and simply sit in God's presence, perhaps using a short mantra – such as *Jesus, remember me* – as a focus. The time is brought to a close with the return of quiet music. *You can just turn up!*

Queen Edith – a follow-up

Sharing the key learning points from the Queen Edith book and the Queen Edith Festival.

A drawing of an outcome Heritage vision which comes from these learning points and research, will be on display at the History Open Evening on 11th July (see poster on page 16).

The book, 'Royal Rutland – the story of Queen Edith'.

- The book by Pauline Stafford provides us with the key to rediscovering 600 years of Anglo-Saxon history and the creation of Roteland - 'the land belonging to Rota' (Jill Bourne).
- Rota was a minor king among the loose federation of Anglo-Saxon tribal groups known as the Middle Angles. He was a king of considerable power and importance- no other unit of land of such size in England is named after one man (JB).
- Queen Edith was the last Anglo-Saxon queen to hold these lands in Roteland.

The Queen Edith Festival

- The Festival was a huge success because of the support and enthusiastic contribution from many different groups including re-enactors, artisans, educators, church members, dancers,

actors, dignitaries, local businesses and history groups.

- Over 600 visitors of all ages (inside/outside All Saints and around Oakham) came to the Festival to discover more about Queen Edith and the Anglo-Saxon heritage of Roteland.
- Roteland is not a county but a kingdom; a Pre-Mercian, Middle Angles Kingdom, the boundaries of which may go back into the Iron Age or even earlier (JB).
- Rutland is of World Heritage importance as it is the only preserved Kingdom of Middle Angles in England. *Paul Wiggin*

Friends – your help needed

The Friends of All Saints' Church, Oakham is a charitable organisation, which was established in 1993. The current focus is to provide varied social events and trips at a reasonable cost. In general, trips break-even and only generate a surplus when the coach is completely filled. The balance of the surplus is generated through raffles, subscription income, Gift Aid and keeping expenses to a minimum. This focus, after removing exceptional items, can leave an annual surplus, which is used to fund church projects. In recent years we have given generously to the church: £15,000.00 towards the new Sound System, £4,500.00 to the Windows Restoration Project, over £2,000.00 so far to the new Lighting Project and countless smaller sums for a banners, display stands, card machines, signage and sashes etc.

Membership is open to all and currently stands at about 110. In order to encourage the widest possible membership, the subscription has remained at £5 per person per calendar year since founding in 1993 but I would like to stress that not being a member of Friends does not preclude anyone from attending one of our events. However, I have decided that the time has now come for me to step down from the Chairman's role after the AGM in March 2025. I shall have dedicated myself to the Friends for seven years but really need someone younger to take over now. It is not an onerous task but does require both good organisational and computer skills.

The ideal situation would be for someone to step forward and volunteer but I fear it will be more a case of gentle persuasion and/or arm twisting and of course, it would be good for someone to be able to come along to Committee meetings now and go through a period of hand-over. Please do think about whether it is something you could do; there would be plenty of help and guidance available and we would all be so sad if the Friends as an organisation had to close due to lack of support.
